


'When Art Needs an Essay To be Understood'¹

Robert takes a critical approach. Opening conversation around the conceptual relevance of tension and fighting of science and theology. Seen and felt. Suggesting these installations have too many layers of thought to them that an essay is needed to fully understand them. Allowing the audience to fully grasp the depths of the artwork in hand.

I often find my work will host an immediate impression on the audience – colour, texture, sounds, and scale all spark interest and draw on sense memories to begin a conversation between medium and audience. However, there is much more to be unpacked and wrestled within the installation.
